## **Christ Church to Participate in Jesus Fest**

In addition to collecting food for the Harrison County Ministerial Association's "Food Drive" organized in cooperation and partnership with the August 11 and 12 Jesus Fest, Christ Church will be sharing the Episcopal Diocese of West Virginia's prayer labyrinth. The labyrinth will be located in Jackson Square.

A prayer labyrinth is a tool for walking prayer and provides space for a journey into our center, the place of our deepest thoughts and connections with God. The labyrinth is

used for prayer and meditation, and many churches, including Episcopal churches, have permanent labyrinths installed on church grounds for parishioners to use. When walking into the labyrinth, you can think of your regrets, disappointments, anger, and "sins" and offer them to God and ask for forgiveness. Or perhaps you would want to reflect on "gratitude" and give thanks to God for all the things for which you are thankful.



The labyrinth is an ancient spiritual tool that has been used throughout the world for over four thousand years. A labyrinth is a circuitous path with one entrance point that leads through a series of switchbacks to its center. A labyrinth is not a maze. A maze has dead-ends and blind alleyways. Its intention is confusion and mystery, but the labyrinth when followed leads eventually and without making choices to the center. It is designed for one to find his/her way.

Here are some steps to follow when walking an Episcopal prayer labyrinth:

- 1. Prepare to walk. Take some time to transition from your everyday life to the labyrinth experience. Remove your watch. Slow your breathing. Still your mind. Open yourself to possibilities.
- 2. Begin your journey. Pause at the entrance to the labyrinth to take a cleansing breath and focus your attention.
- 3. Walk the inward path. Follow the path slowly and deliberately, allowing yourself to be present in the moment.
- 4. Spend time in the center. When you reach the center of the labyrinth, pause and reflect on your journey inward.
- 5. Take the return path. Follow the path back out of the labyrinth, again moving slowly and deliberately.
- 6. After you have completed your walk, take some time to reflect on the journey.
