July 21, 2019 – Pentecost 6 (C) Meet Our Missionaries: Peter Bak, Episcopal Volunteers in Mission



An update from Peter Bak, an Episcopal Volunteer in Mission (EVIM) serving in the Anglican Church of Tanzania:

I work at St. Philip's Theological College, which has been serving the Anglican Church of Tanzania for over 100 years. A normal day means anything can happen. My first lesson here was how to be flexible. Most days I work with two gentlemen, Amose and Goodluck. We work well together and learn from each other as we rebuild a piece of campus, paint, install new glass, repair gutters, and so on. We find ourselves doing something different every day.

Why did you choose to serve as an Episcopal Volunteer in Mission?

I chose to serve as an Episcopal Volunteer in Mission because I wanted to give back. Throughout my life, people have supported me in many different ways and I wanted to share that gift with others. The first time I thought about being a missionary was when I was doing hospice visits back home in Rhode Island. I was able to train the first Pitbull to serve in hospice in Rhode Island. Her name was Lucy and when I saw the affection shared between the clients and Lucy, I was filled with joy. Each time I was able to put a smile on someone's face, it felt fantastic. I wanted to serve as a missionary because I believed that it could also bring me that joy and offer me an opportunity to build relationships outside of what I have always known.



How can we pray for you and the people you work with?

Like many ministries in the Church, there are many more needs than physical resources. That is why I quite often turn to prayer, asking for ideas about how to do a job with less. Right now the largest building on campus has been pressure washed and repaired but awaits paint supplies.

In addition, all of the student housing is in desperate need of exterior and interior painting. This is part of the story I will share when visiting Episcopal churches in Rhode Island when I return home again.
